Math, Science and English graduates commit 2 years to teaching disadvantaged schools

Forty-three graduates in South Africa are dedicating two years of their time over the 2015/2016 academic year to students in disadvantaged schools nationally through TEACH South Africa - a programme that recruits, trains and supports the most talented recent university graduates (ambassadors) to commit to teaching for a minimum of two years in some of South Africa's most disadvantaged schools in rural and semi-urban areas.
