Refugees, Migrants and Displaced Persons

A certain institutional harshness in some quarters continues to bedevil the suffering of the millions of people on the move, especially as governments seek to tighten possibilities for legal entry into their countries, prejudices grow and there is insufficient aid to provide for the immediate needs of these vulnerable people. One of the groups hardest hit are children and young people. This is true across the world and the Trump administration's decision to close the DACA program within six months, is another chilling example of this groups vulnerability. One positive aspect is that as the contestation around refugee issues mount, so is the development of a theology and praxis of solidarity by the Church with those who suffer in this context.

Pope Francis commented negatively on President Trump's decision to stop the DACA [Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals] program under which almost 800,000 young people brought to the USA illegally as children would be allowed to stay in the USA. The decision announced by Attorney General Sessions would put these young people at risk of detention or deportation. The original program was started by President Obama.

Bishop Mark Seitz of El Paso, on the border between the USA and Mexico, issued a strongly worded pastoral statement condemning the demonization of migrants and indefensible hateful words about

Mexicans. He called the US immigration system 'a wound and a scandal' that elected officials have not had the moral courage to address. He went on to say that building walls, mass deportation and the militarisation of the border are not solutions.
